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- 1) The number of prisoners held in Massachusetts facilities increased from 5,931 on 7/1/23 to 6,113 on 7/1/24, an increase of 182 prisoners or .03%. (Table 1)
- 2. The changes by race were: Caucasian down 39, African-American up 173, Hispanics up 51, Asians up 14, and Other down 55. The total of 144 reflects the 38 missing prisoners from Bridgewater. (Table 2)
- 3. The number of lifers decreased by 19 from 7/1/23 20 more second degree lifers and 39 fewer first degree lifers. (Table 3)
- 4. Lifers comprised 31% of all Massachusetts prisoners housed in MA. When those serving 15+ years are added, the total equals 47% of MA prisoners on 7/1/24, a slight decrease from 7/1/23 at 48.5%. (Table 3)
- 5. Fifty- one percent of prisoners in MA prisons had Personal Crimes as their governing offenses a decrease of 56 from 7/1/23; 17% had sex crimes as their governing offenses an increase of 11 prisoners from 7/1/23; and 12% had drug offenses as their governing offenses an increase of 100 prisoners from 7/1/23. (Table 4)
- 6. The facility with the largest number of lifers was MCIN with 602 52% of the facility's population and 35% of all MA lifers. MCIS had the second highest number of lifers with 299 or 31% of that institution's population and 17% of all lifers in MA prisons. (Table 5)
- 7. The DOC closed MCIC as of 7/1/24 which represents a 10% loss in overall Operational Capacity. On 7/1/24, the DOC's prisons operated at a 75% capacity rate, an increase from 60% on 7/1/23. (Table 6)
- 8. The highest percentage of Caucasians (71%) were housed at MASAC; the highest institutional percenatge of African-Americans (39%) were housed at Bridgewater; and the highest institutional percentage of Hispanics (52%) were housed at Boston Pre-Release. (Table 9)
- 9. On 7/1/24, the maximum prison operated at 71% capacity, down from 74% on 7/1/23; medium prisons operated at 81% capacity, up from 68% on 7/1/23; and minimum/pre-release facilities operated at 48% capacity, up from 43% on 7/1/24. (Table 7)
- 10. On 7/1/24, in maximum, 12% of all prisoners were listed as Caucasians, up from 11% on 7/1/23; 21% were listed as African Americans, down from 22% on 7/1/23; and 23% were listed as Hispanics, down from 24% on 7/1/23. (Table 10)

- 11. On 7/1/24, of prisoners housed in Medium, 82% were listed as Caucasians equal to the percentage on 7/1/23; 72% were listed as African-Americans down from 73% on 7/1/23; and 67% were listed as Hispanics down from 69% on 7/1/23. (Table 10)
- 12. On 7/1/24 of prisoners housed in Minimu/Pre-Release, 6% were listed as Caucasian down from 7% on 7/1/23; 7% were listed as African-Americans up from 5% on 7/1/23; and 10% were listed as Hispanics up from 7% on 7/1/23. (Table 10)
- 13. On 7/1/24, 38% of all MA prisoners were listed as Caucasians down from 39% on 7/1/23; 31% were listed as African-Americans up from 29% on 7/1/23; and 28% were listed as Hispanics up from 27% on 7/1/23. (Table 10)

An additional 134 MA prisoners were housed out-of-state for a total of 6,247 prisoners under MA jurisdiction, 55 fewer or a drop of 29% from July 1, 2023. Of the 134 prisoners in out-of-state facilities, 52 were serving life sentences (35 serving first degree and 17 serving second degree).

#### Commentary

- 1. On July 1, 2024, the DOC's minimum and pre-release facilities combined operated at 48% of their operational capacities, an increase from 43% on July 1, 2023. Still, the DOC is operating its lower security facilities at less than 50% capacity. This constitutes a gross waste of resources. In addition, the DOC has announced that it is closing OCCC's minimum, a loss of 160 beds. While this will raise the overall operating percenatge, assuming the number of prisoners housed in minimum and pre-release remains relatively the same. But, the anomaly is that the DOC reports that it costs more to house a prisoner in minimum and pre-release than in medium prisons precisely because the DOC operates the lower security facilites at such a low occupancy percentage: If the DOC operated the lower security prisons at 80% or even 85%, then the costs perprisoner would plummet.
- 2. It is notable that of the 527 prisoners in minimum/pre-release facilities, only 45 or 8.5% on 7/1/24 were housed in pre-release facilties.
- 3. Equally notable is that in Fiscal Year 2023, over 70% of the funds expended by the DOC for Inmate Programs went to Spectrum which primarily is contracted to provide addiction programming. Yet, only 13% of all prisoners on July 1, 2024 had a drug related governing offense. (Table 8) At MCI-N, 97 out of 1158 prisoners had drug governing offenses, MCI-S had 141 of 949, at NCCI 65 out of 862, and at Souza 140 out of 1083. (Table 5) While there is little doubt that treating addiction issues is important, that should not come at the expense of educational and vocational or other rehabilitative programs for the 87% who are not serving drug offenses.
- 4. The DOC has yet to correct a problem concerning racial data. The problem, as noted in the Liefr's Group Inc. 2023 report on the Institutional Fact cards, is that many Latinos (Hispanic is the DOC categorization) report that they have been classified as white. The exact number is unknown, but this difference could skew some of the racial data. Once again, the DOC needs to reassess its racial designations to correct any inaccuracies.
- 5. In Table 10, only Caucasians, African-Americans and Hispanics are included as those three racial designaitons comprise over 97% of all prisoners housed in MA facilities.
